


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## Achievements – Ipswich Region

### EDUCATION

- Bellbird Park State Secondary College – a Public Private Partnership (PPP) school which opened in 2017, for Years 7-to 12, commencing with Year 7 and growing a year level until 2022 for Year 12 students; in 2019, stage 2 opened.
- Fernbrooke State School, Redbank Plains – a PPP school which opened in 2017, for Prep to Year 6.
- Spring Mountain State School, Springfield – a PPP school which opened in 2019, for Prep to Year 6.
- \$102.8M total funding in the region under the Building Future Schools Program for two schools which opened in 2020:
  - \$45.57M Ripley Valley State School (prep to Year 6)
  - \$57.23M Ripley Valley State Secondary College (Years 7 and 8)
- \$10.93M total funding under the Advancing Queensland Schools Halls Program for a new hall at the Springfield Central State High School – completed.
- \$63.96M total funding in the region to make schools 2020 Ready:

### Works for Queensland – Ipswich region

- The Ipswich Region was not eligible for any Works for Queensland funding in rounds prior to the 2020-21 COVID round.
- Through the **2020-21 COVID round funding, the:**
  - **Ipswich region** received \$7.50M for 28 projects supporting nearly 168 jobs, to date 27 projects are now complete.
  - **ICC** received \$4.44M for 12 projects supporting around 30 jobs - all projects are now complete.
- As part of the **\$50M 2020-21 Unite & Recover Community Stimulus Package SEQ Round**, the:
  - **region** has received almost \$17.0M for 23 projects supporting around 680 jobs, to date 21 projects are now complete.
  - **ICC** received \$3.87M for 7 projects supporting around 27 jobs, to date 6 projects are now complete.
- In the latest round, the **2021-24 SEQ Community Stimulus Program**, the:
  - region has received \$16.05M for 18 projects supporting over 15 jobs, to date 1 project has been completed.
  - **ICC** received \$6.67M for 2 projects supporting 4 jobs – projects are yet to be completed.






## LAVO partnership fuels Queensland's hydrogen industry

Greater Springfield will be home to Australia's first hydrogen fuel cell manufacturing facility, further boosting Queensland's growing hydrogen industry and creating hundreds of new local jobs.

The Queensland Government is partnering with LAVO Hydrogen Technology Ltd to establish the \$15 million facility, which is supported by the government's Invested in Queensland program as part of its \$3.34 billion Queensland Jobs Fund. The project will support up to 200 local jobs during the construction phase and will generate almost 170 long-term operational jobs when production at the new facility ramps up.

Queensland is a global energy powerhouse with its abundance of sunshine, clean water and open skies, attracting investment opportunities that will firmly establish our state's reputation as Australia's home for hydrogen production. By partnering with private companies like LAVO, the Queensland Government expects to create up to 5,000 new jobs over the life of its Invested in Queensland program.

## New primary school for Ripley Valley

A new state primary school for Ripley Valley is currently being built for the increasing school-aged population in one of the fastest-growing areas of South East Queensland.

The Queensland Government has invested close to \$60 million to construct the new primary school in Ripley, which will open its doors in 2023. It is the second primary school in the Ripley Valley Priority Development Area, which is set to be home to 120,000 people once fully developed over the next 4 decades.

At full capacity, the school will accommodate up to 1,200 students from Prep to Year 6 and employ up to 100 full-time teaching and support staff. For its first year, the school will open for all year levels from Prep to Year 6.

The Queensland Government is investing \$311.6 million in new and improved education infrastructure in the Ipswich region during 2022–23.



## Schools – Overview

### Recommended response

- In **2022-23 \$311.6M is being invested** on education to maintain, improve and upgrade schools in the Ipswich region.
- We are investing **\$16.5 billion in 2022-23 in school and early childhood education, with hundreds of infrastructure projects to improve schools from the Gold Coast to the Cape.**
- Since **coming to Government in 2015**, we have opened **21 new schools.**
- We have **11 more new schools planned for 2023 and 2024, and another five for 2025 and 2026.**
- Thanks to more than **\$1.9 billion in infrastructure investment**, existing buildings will be expanded and improved, supporting thousands of jobs.
- Queensland is a growing state and we are delivering the infrastructure and educational facilities needed to support this growth.
- The 2022-23 Budget also includes funding of **nearly \$220 million over two years for additional classrooms at existing schools** experiencing in-catchment enrolment growth.
- **Of the 49 schools in the Ipswich City Council area:**
  - **five new schools opened over the past four years** – in 2017, Bellbird Park State Secondary College Stage 1 and Fernbrooke State School at Redbank Plains, in 2019, Spring Mountain State School and in 2020, Ripley Valley State School and Ripley Valley State Secondary College;
  - **a further new school in Ripley will open in 2025 or 2026;**
  - major infrastructure work carried out at **42 schools totalling \$79M;**
  - **\$103.36M worth of works at 24 schools** is in progress or being planned and; and
  - **all schools have air conditioning** and solar panels installed.

### *Air conditioning and solar panels*

- On 27 February 2020, the Government announced the Cooler Cleaner Schools Program (CCSP) which will provide more than \$477M over 4 years to air condition state schools and expand the existing ACES program.
- On 19 April 2022, the Government announced the CCSP has been fully delivered, providing all Queensland state school classrooms, libraries and staff rooms with air conditioning. Installations were completed over two months ahead of schedule to ensure air-conditioned spaces were available from the start of Term 2, 2022.
- The CCSP replaced the Government's former Cooler Schools Program.
