Dear Mr Scott

I am writing to you in accordance with instructions received from Mr Jon Grayson, Director-General of the Department of the Premier and Cabinet, Queensland Government.

In this respect, I refer you to the ABC's *7.30 Report* screened on 29 October 2013, and certain statements made during that program regarding Mr Grayson's role as the government member of the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Authority (GBRMPA) and his ownership of a passive interest in Gasfields Water and Waste Management Pty Ltd (GWWM).

In this regard, your program failed to establish that any conflict of interest exists, because none does. In this regard, GBRMPA has not considered any port developments, or any other matters, relevant to the interests of GWWM.

I am also instructed that your program emphasised links to the Obeid family. This element of the program appears to have no purpose but to add sensation by incorrectly inferring that Mr Grayson's relationship with Mr Eddie Obeid Jnr extends to a business relationship beyond a common shareholding.

Mr Grayson wishes to reiterate the comments provided by the Premier's spokesperson on this matter, and rejects any suggestion that he has a conflict of interest. Mr Grayson will fully co-operate with the independent probity inquiry requested by the Federal Minister for the Environment, the Honourable Greg Hunt MP, and looks forward to its findings.



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Whilst Mr Grayson welcomes public debate on important matters affecting the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park, he would encourage the ABC to report responsibly on these matters.

To this end Mr Grayson is concerned that the ABC has published in its report statements that are both misleading and injurious to his reputation. He is currently considering the options available to him to redress this situation, and will monitor any further publication by the ABC on this matter.


Subject to your agreement in principle, we will work closely with your office on the preferred date and format for the launch event.







Overview

The 2012 Annual General Meeting of the European Australian Business Council (EABC) was held on 17 May in the Theatre@ Parliament House, Macquarie Street, Sydney.

Members of the EABC Board, Corporate Members, Charter Members as well as partners from many official Australian and European government representatives and agencies participated in the proceedings.

At the conclusion of the formal meeting, a reception was held in the Jubilee Room with special guest the Hon Julie Bishop MP, Deputy Leader of the Opposition and Shadow Minister for Foreign Affairs and Trade.

Annual General Meeting

The AGM was opened by Chief Executive Officer Jason Collins who acknowledged the many dignitaries in attendance. Apologies were received and the Minutes of the 2011 Annual General Meeting were adopted.

Treasurer's Report

Treasurer Ian Murray presented the financial report for the year and the audited accounts. A strong result was recorded with total revenues for the year of \$504,718 (2010: \$714,857), a small overall deficit of \$6,404 (2010: +\$14,923), and new income of \$70,000 (invoiced in the period but not included in the revenue figure).

The year ended with an accumulated surplus of \$120,220, and cash in the bank of \$72,010. The audit conducted by PKF was unqualified. The Treasurer thanked all members for their support and the Secretariat for the strong performance. The financial report was adopted.

Arthur Milner and Andres Reith from PKF and Phillip Mitchell and Silke Koernicke from honorary legal advisors TracsCox were thanked by motion and given presentations. Motions were also passed re-appointing the firms in their respective capacities.

Chairman-Alastair Walton recognised and thanked the members of the Board present at the AGM and moved that new members of the Board appointed under the casual vacancy provisions of the Constitution be approved. The appointments of Professor Stephanie Fahy (Monash University), Angus Armour (EFIC), Peter Grey (Austcorp), David Horne (National Australia Bank), Bruce Morgan (PwC), Taine Moulafoghi (Sencorp) and Olivia Wirth (Qantas) were confirmed by the meeting.

The Chairman then moved that constitutional amendments previously circulated be moved enabling any corporate partners designated as a 'Major Partner' be entitled to automatically nominate a representative to the board. The resolution was passed.

Alastair Walton delivered the President's Report and Jason Collins the Chief Executive Report. The reports highlighted the continued growth in the Council's membership, activities and profile - and the significance of the visit by European Commission President Barroso last September. Europe remains a critical investor in the Australian economy and Australia is an increasingly important partner for Europe in Asia-Pacific and in the G20.

Andrea Nicolet from the Delegation of the European Union to Australia and New Zealand and Karen Lanyon from the Department of Foreign Affairs addressed the meeting and complimented the Council on its activities and support for the bilateral relationship.

Cocktail Reception

Following the AGM, a cocktail reception was held in the Jubilee Room of Parliament House with special guest the Hon Julie Bishop MP, Deputy Leader of the Opposition and Shadow Minister for Foreign Affairs and Shadow Minister for Trade.

EABC CEO Jason Collins acknowledged guests and dignitaries present at the reception before they were officially welcomed by EABC President Alastair Walton, Dignitaries and officials in attendance included Peter Doyle, Karen Lanyon, Danielle Morris (Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade), Ambassador Vicente Bluk (Croatia), Ambassador Krassimir Stefanov (Bulgaria), High Commissioner Francis Tabone (Malta), and Andrea Nicolet, Delegation of the European Union to Australia & NZ.

The Parliamentary Host for the AGM and Reception was Stuart Ayres MP, Member for Penrith, who welcomed all members and guests and the Deputy Leader.

Julie Bishop was introduced by Board Member and Chairman of the Sydney Airport Corporation Max Moore-Wilton AC.

Julie Bishop addressed members on the financial crisis and the crisis in the euro area exacerbated by fundamental political and economic challenges. These challenges form part of a wider set of global challenges as China and India rapidly develop, economically and whose influence in regional and global affairs expands at all levels. China has become an important investor in economies close to Australia.

Australian policy-makers need to address the key question of investment in Australia, particularly sensitive areas of agricultural land and natural resources, which also have implications for Europe as a long-term investor in Australia. Ms Bishop and Nationals Leader Warren Truss will soon launch a discussion paper into FDI rules. Europe is a welcome investment partner whose companies have made an enormous contribution to Australia's economic development.

A vote of thanks was proposed by EABC Board Member and PwC Chairman Bruce Morgan.
