#### CAMPBELL NEWMAN AND LNP ON THE SLIDE

Campbell Newman's decision to take on the motorcycle gangs is proving costly with support for the LNP and his own satisfaction dropping since late last year. Opinion is now divided on whether the laws were needed in the first place and the majority of Queenslanders are of the opinion that Campbell Newman has done a poor job introducing the new laws.

These are the main findings of the latest Galaxy Poll conducted exclusively for The Courier Mail on the evenings of 5-6 February. The poll is based on a large sample of 800 voters distributed throughout the state.

Primary support for the LNP has slumped to 41%, down 4 percentage points since the last Galaxy Poll conducted in November 2013 and almost 9 percentage points below the vote achieved at the last state election. In contrast, support for the Labor Party is on the rise and now stands at 36%.

Support for the minor parties is little changed since the last Galaxy Poll, with the Greens on 8%, Bob Katter's Australian Party on 6% and minor parties and independents on 9% support.

Following the allocation of preferences this results in a two party preferred figure of 53% for the LNP and 47% for Labor. This shows a swing to Labor of 4 percentage points since the last Galaxy Poll in November.

The majority of Queensland voters are now dissatisfied with the performance of Campbell Newman as Premier. Overall, 53% are dissatisfied with his performance and only 40% satisfied. This is his worst satisfaction rating since becoming Premier in March 2012.

Opinion continues to be divided on the performance of Annastacia Palaszczuk as Opposition Leader, with 35% of voters satisfied, 35% dissatisfied and 30% uncommitted.

Annastacia Palaszczuk continues to trail Campbell Newman on the better Premier question, 47% to 36%, with 17% uncommitted.

The new laws targeting outlaw motorcycle gangs are hurting the state government. Opinion is now divided with 48% of voters in favour of the new laws and 45% opposed. In November, the majority of Queenslanders (56%) were in favour.

While the majority of LNP supporters (72%) remain in favour of the new laws, Labor supporters are more likely to be opposed (63%).

There is a growing sense that the new laws are too tough. Overall, 50% of voters think the new laws are too tough, up from 41% late last year.

In contrast, 41% believe the new laws are about right, down from 44%, and only 4% consider them not tough enough, down from 8%.



Labor supporters (65%) are more likely to take the view that the new laws are too tough, while the majority of LNP supporters consider them about right (58%).

Opinion is divided on the concern expressed by the judiciary in regard to the new legislation. While 50% take the view that this concern shows that judges and lawyers have a better understanding than politicians, 43% interpret the concerns as confirmation that judges and lawyers are out of touch and too soft on criminals.

While Labor supporters are more likely to side with judges and lawyers over LNP politicians, the majority of LNP supporters put the criticism down to the judiciary being too soft on criminals.

The majority of voters (56%) believe Campbell Newman and the state government have done a poor job introducing the new laws and explaining why they are needed. This has increased from 46% in November.

Confidence in the state has fallen since late last year. In the latest poll only 50% of voters believe the state is heading in the right direction, down from 56% in November. In contrast, 44% are of the opinion that the state is heading in the wrong direction.

This is the most pessimistic assessment of the state's performance since February 2012.

The majority of LNP supporters (82%) remain convinced that the state is heading in the right direction, but the majority of Labor supporters (69%) do not.

The consequence of this bleak outlook is that most Queenslanders will be focussing on saving (41%) or paying down debt (33%) in 2014.

The overwhelming majority of those aged 18-24 years are looking to save while most 35-49 year olds will be focussing on paying down debt.

### Question from Kathleen Skene (Gold Coast Bulletin)

As discussed, I would like a response from the minister on the questions below. We commissioned a ReachTel poll of 1217 Gold Coast residents on Sunday - this was the question and result:

- About how often will you use the Gold Coast light rail?
- Daily 2.7%
- Weekly 5.7%
- Monthly 10.8%
- Less than monthly 37.3%
- Never 43.5%

In July last year the minister told a budget estimates committee the number of projected trips per day had been significantly reduced from initial projections made under the previous government.

- 1. In the reachtel poll, a strong majority of locals said they would either never use the light rail or would use it less than monthly. What would that sort of ratio in the wider community mean for fare revenue of the light rail system?
- 2. What is the latest trips/day projection for the gc light rail?
- 3. Is the government satisfied with the progress of the light rail project?
- 4. Will there be space for paid advertising on and/or inside gc trams, and/or at light rail stops?

I require a response by 5pm Friday.

### Response from a spokespersor for the Minister for Transport and Main Roads

I would encourage everyone to get out of their cars and use public transport whether it is a train, ferry, bus or tram.

Due to Labor's bungling, patronage figures for the Gold Coast light rail had been revised down to between 17,000 to 20,000 trips a day. This remains the current projection.

This is another example of financial mismanagement by the previous Labor government as they used three year-old data for its business case.

Under LNP management, the light rail project is on track to start services mid-year with the majority of track laid and footpath works nearing completion.

We are in the process of reviewing tender submissions for the management of advertising on the Gold Coast light rail system, including on the tram fleet.

An announcement on the successful agencies will be made once the process is completed.

#### SHANE DOHERTY:

I'm going to suggest some adjectives to you about this poll and I want you to tell me whether you agree or not, Just say yes or no. So, these figures are disastrous?

#### PREMIER:

Well, I reckon at the end of the day it's about serving the community. I've always tried to do the right thing both as a local Member and as Premier of Queensland. I've got a plan for this State and I've got a plan for the Ashgrove electorate and I'm going to deliver it. In Ashgrove, I think, for the last two years there's been a whole lot of things that have been delivered for schools, for community groups, for the environment, and also for some of the traffic upgrades we've done. So, I'm just going to do what I have to do.

#### SHANE DÓRERTY:

So, yes or no - they're disastrous?

### PREMIER:

Oh look, it's a long time until the next election. I don't worry about things like that because I've been in this game for a long time and what matters is serving your community. At the end of the day, it's about delivering and I'm going to do my best to deliver and work as hard as I can over the next year.

#### SHANE DOHERTY:

Do they surprise you?

#### PREMIER:

Oh look, I know that there are many things the Government's had to do over the last two years that still may not be well understood and people question why. But at the end of the day, they're about getting the economy sorted out, creating jobs, about revitalising Government in Queensland, fixing up our school maintenance issues, all those things are happening. So, I'm just going to continue to talk to people about what we're doing and I think they'll see ultimately that they've been actually well served by this Government.

#### SHANE DOHERTY:

Are they fatal, these figures?

#### PREMIER:

I'll leave others to comment on that, but I'm just about doing the right thing for Ashgrove and for Queensland.

# SHANE DOHERTY:

If a safer seat was to pop up, would you leave?

### PREMIER:

Definitely not and I've been asked that question many times over the years. Because, often there has been this sort of commentary about this seat, but I love this area. It's where I first came when I came to Queensland many years ago. It's where I married my wife after meeting her in the electorate. It's where my kids grew up initially. So, I'm very, very fond of this part of town. It's the part of town and the community I want to serve. I'm not going anywhere else.

#### SHANE DOHERTY:

This shows us that the fight with the bikies has cost you some skin, has cost you some political capital. That's fair, isn't it?

#### PREMIER:

Look, people are concerned clearly about the laws but I say to them it's about making Queensland safe. There's been a very strong misinformation campaign about these laws. If people want to come and see me, as Ashgrove constituents can, I'd welcome that. In fact, I've been doing that. But I just stress to people – I want Queensland to be safe for everybody, for everyone in our community and ultimately that's what these laws will achieve.

#### SHANE DOHERTY:

You've been here before you say? With figures like this, you've seen ...?

#### PREMIER:

I've seen the ups and downs of political life. At the end of the day what people need and what we're offering is strong, responsible Government, grown-up Government – that's what they'll always get from me and I think at the end of the day people should bear that in mind, that there's been many politicians in Queensland's recent history that ultimately have been about polls and about populism, not about what's doing right for Queensland and indeed for this local area. I will always do what's right, I will always do what I need to do to serve my local community.

### **SHANE DOHERTY:**

Do you think that its Labor voters whose minds you have to change, that those are the ones that yeah...you have to swing over to your way of thinking, especially in this seat?

#### PREMIER:

I just think I've got to continue to do the job I'm doing which is to make sure that the schools here are well-supported and they have been. We've put in new classrooms at the Ashgrove State School, there's a new sports hall at The Gap, there's a great project I want to undertake for the Enoggera State School if I'm reelected. We've been dealing with the maintenance problems with our school, in all our State schools. We've got a great traffic congestion project at Samford and Wardell. Those are the things that I've been doing, that's what I'll continue to do. At the next election people will have a choice — they can decide to have a Premier who can deliver for the local area and for the State or they can make a decision to go with someone else. I'm relaxed about that because at the end of the day I am all about serving people, not just following popularity contests.

#### SHANE DOHERTY:

I'm going to suggest some adjectives to you about this poll and I want you to tell me whether you agree or not, Just say yes or no. So, these figures are disastrous?

#### PREMIER:

Well, I reckon at the end of the day it's about serving the community. I've always tried to do the right thing both as a local Member and as Premier of Queensland. I've got a plan for this State and I've got a plan for the Ashgrove electorate and I'm going to deliver it. In Ashgrove, I think, for the last two years there's been a whole lot of things that have been delivered for schools, for community groups, for the environment, and also for some of the traffic upgrades we've done. So, I'm just going to do what I have to do.

#### SHANE DOHERTY:

So, yes or no - they're disastrous?

#### PREMIER:

Oh look, it's a long time until the next election. I don't worry about things like that because I've been in this game for a long time and what matters is serving your community. At the end of the day, it's about delivering and I'm going to do my best to deliver and work as hard as I can over the next year.

# Polls show Labor support rising in two Qld seats

Results of two new opinion polls suggest the Labor Party in Queensland is winning back support in traditionally safe seats, following the huge swings to the LNP at the 2012 state election.

The polls correspondingly show a significant fall in support for the State Government.

The union group Working for Queenslanders commissioned ReachTel to survey the seats of Sandgate and Ipswich West.

The results show a swing away from the LNP of between 11 and 15 per cent.

The seats were held by Labor prior to the LNP's landslide election win.

However, Alex Scott from the Together Union says the poll result is more than just a natural re-alignment.

"What we are now seeing isn't a correction," he said.

"It's a major seismic shift in the voting population and we're seeing the south-east corner, clearly indicating that they are moving in ways never seen before and primarily because of the attacks on the health system."

A spokesman for Premier Campbell Newman says the State Government does not comment on union push polling.

The surveys have a margin of error of up to 3.9 per cent.

#### LNP RECOVERS LOST GROUND

The LNP has recovered from the slump observed earlier in the year as voters see merit in the laws targeting outlaw motorcycle gangs. Campbell Newman's satisfaction rating, however, continues to fall with the majority of Queenslanders of the opinion that the Premier has done a poor job introducing the new laws.

These are the main findings of the latest Galaxy Poll conducted exclusively for the Courier Mail on the evenings of 21-22 May. The poll is based on a large sample of 800 voters distributed throughout the state.

Primary support for the LNP has picked up from the low of 41% observed in February and now stands at 43%. In contrast, support for the Labor Party has slipped to 34%.

Support for the minor parties is little changed since the last Galaxy Poll, with the Greens on 8%, Bob Katter's Australian Party on 5% and minor parties and independents on 10% support.

Following the allocation of preferences this results in a two party preferred figure of 55% for the LNP and 45% for Labor. This shows a swing back to the government of 2 percentage points since the last Galaxy Poll in February.

Campbell Newman's satisfaction rating continues to fall. For the first time since becoming Premier in 2012, the Galaxy Poll in February confirmed there were more voters dissatisfied with his performance than satisfied. This trend has continued and there are now 55% of voters across the state dissatisfied with his performance.

Despite this declining satisfaction with the Premier, the Leader of the Opposition has been unable to build her profile. Only 33% of voters are satisfied with the performance of Annastacia Palaszczuk as Opposition Leader (down 2 percentage points since the last Galaxy Poll), 37% are dissatisfied and 30% remain uncommitted.

With Annastacia Palaszczuk unable to capitalise on the declining popularity of Campbell Newman, she continues to trail on the better Premier question by a wide margin, 48% to 33%, with 19% uncommitted.

After appearing popular when the new laws targeting outlaw motorcycle gangs were announced, support for the initiative slipped earlier this year. Support for the laws has now been restored with 56% of voters in favour and 36% opposed. The proportion opposed has dropped by 9 percentage points since February.

Despite this improvement in support for the new laws there remains concern over their introduction, with the majority of voters (52%) of the opinion that Campbell Newman and the state government have done a poor job introducing the new laws and explaining why they are needed.



The recent focus on the austerity measures announced in the budget has not impacted on the level of optimism across the state. With 50% of voters believing the state is heading in the right direction and 45% of the opinion that the state is heading in the wrong direction, this is little changed since the last Galaxy Poli conducted in February.

The majority of LNP supporters (83%) remain convinced that the state is heading in the right direction, but the majority of Labor supporters (72%) do not.

In the poll, respondents were asked the area of activity the government should make their focus for their debt reduction strategy. The choices offered were based on those outlined by Treasurer Tim Nicholls when he launched the Strong Choices campaign.

The Galaxy Poll confirmed that selling or leasing some government assets (38%) is the preferred area of focus for the debt reduction strategy, followed by reducing government services (24%) and significantly increasing taxes (21%).

Selling or leasing some government assets is the preferred option among both LNP supporters (46%) and Labor supporters (33%). However, should the government pursue this strategy this is likely to be met with some hostility as the majority of voters across the state, including two thirds of Labor supporters, would prefer some other solution.

# Tim Cox:

It's a pleasure to welcome Treasurer Tim Nicholls back to the program, Treasurer good afternoon to you.

#### **Tim Nicholls:**

G'day Tim, thanks for having me on.

TC:

The main message today appears to be steady as she goes, but also gird thy loins for the possibility and perhaps the eventuality of asset sales with the need for the mandate attached to that. How far down that path is Queensland today?

#### **Tim Nicholis:**

Well Tim what we've spoken about today is what we've been able to achieve over the past two years and where Queensland now is and we've got economic growth of 3.6 compared to a national average of 2.7

I think surprisingly most people haven't picked up on this, over three-quarters of the new jobs created in Australia to the end of last year were created here in Queensland. So some really good news and I think really important that people understand that Queensland is turning the corner in terms of the economy.

But the thing that's holding us back is that \$80 billion dollar cloud of debt that's hanging over us and we've got to make some choices, and that's what I explained at CEDA today, that the government is going to have a conversation with all Queenslanders about the choices that we need to make if we're going to really grasp the nettle and have that future that seems so bright ahead of us come to fruition.

#### TC:

If the economic indicators though are already so promising, why is there a need to even consider asset sales?

#### Tim Nicholls:

Well Tim the one thing that's holding us back from being able to invest in the future is the amount of debt we have. And I think if you think about it this way — Queensland is like a family that's overcommitted on its mortgage, we've maxed out the credit cards but we still need to find a way to renovate the house and educate the kids, and we've got a couple of cars and a few other things around the place.

If we go to the bank they say, no we're not going to lend you any more money, you've got too much on your mortgage anyway and your credit cards are all maxed out. So we have to make some choices, are we going to sell a few things, are we not going to renovate the house, or are the kids not going to go to school and enjoy perhaps the sports and extracurricular activities they want.

And that's the sort of choice as a government we face, and it's the sort of choice that households face. Now some of them, we might not like to have to make those choices but we have to make them if we're going to behave in a mature and sensible way.

And so that's what we're really saying, it's time to have that discussion, it's a mature, sensible discussion, it's not shrill, it's not yelling policy positions and those sorts of things, it's about making those choices and that's what we're starting to talk about now.

#### TC:

Do you believe though that the average Queenslander, with all due respect to him or her, is in a position to understand what happens when you take your scoping studies and you say this is an asset the state should be rid of, it should maximise, the average Queenslander wouldn't know would they?

#### Tim Nicholls:

Look I think they do, I think people when they know what is going on, when they know the state's debt is \$80 billion dollars, and that's more for example than NSW, It's more than Victoria and on an individual basis, per person it's \$15,000 per person whereas the average for rest of Australia is about \$8,700 per person.

So people know you've got growing pains, they know you have to invest in the future, we want the roads, we want the schools, we want the hospitals, but if you've got the mortgage at the top end and you can't borrow any more then you need to do something about it.

So I've got great faith that Queenslanders do understand that and I've got great faith that if we have a proper debate and a proper discussion, we're not forcing it down anyone's throat we're just saying these are the choices we face and we're going to get that debate.

I welcome it, the Premier and I will be traveling the state making sure that we are listening to Queenslanders, we've done that with the Queensland plan, there's no doubt we think we can do that in terms of our immediate economic future and that's what we're going to be talking about.

TC:

It's obviously an issue that does divide people, it's also an issue that without the sort of mandate you're describing, the Premier describes as well Tim Nicholls, the sort of thing that can see a government tossed from office. But are there other measures as well? Selling off state assets is of course a fairly blunt instrument.

#### Tim Nicholls:

Well sure, there are quite a few things that we've already done; we've reined in expenses to the tune of \$7.5 billion dollars. Our expenses growth last year, by cutting bureaucracy and red tape and so on has only been 0.2 per cent, the lowest in a decade, and it compares with 9 per cent that our predecessors spent on average each year in increased expenses.

So we've done a lot of things to trim our own expenses, but ultimately that big number, that big \$80 billion dollars and this is what the Commission of Audit has found out and most commentators will say, is holding us back. We just can't borrow any more to do things like the Bruce highway upgrades and so on; we're paying almost \$4 billion dollars a year in interest, now you can imagine what you can do with \$4 billion dollars i a year, you could duplicate the Bruce highway between Brisbane and Rockhampton, you could build 200 new schools and put on 1000 new teachers and still have money left over.

So that's dead money if you like, that interest payment, \$490,000 dollars an hour, each and every hour, each and every day. So these are the choices that we face – do we increase taxes? Most people don't like that. Are services reduced? Most people don't like that and I don't think it's viable in a growing state. Or do we sell or lease some of these government enterprises and reinvest that money in paying down debt and building the infrastructure we know we'll need in future.

#### TC:

Are you confident though that the timeline you've set and the timeline that you are basing your reputation, presumably, your re-election on is the right timeline? Is it a prudent and long-term advisable timeline do you think?

#### Tim Nicholis:

Well Tim we're doing this because we think it's the right thing to do for Queensland. And we believe and I'm sure people understand this government is a government that makes decisions that it believes are in the best interest of Queensland, we're not a poll driven Government, we're a Government about making the right decision and doing the right thing.

We think the right thing to do is not to spring it on people as a surprise as our predecessors did, but to have that debate about and to say to people, this is the state of the finances, these are the choices we make. # **SHANE DOHERTY:**

I'm going to suggest some adjectives to you about this poll and I want you to tell me whether you agree or not, Just say yes or no. So, these figures are disastrous?

#### PREMIER:

Well, I reckon at the end of the day it's about serving the community. I've always tried to do the right thing both as a local Member and as Premier of Queensland. I've got a plan for this State and I've got a plan for the Ashgrove electorate and I'm going to deliver it. In Ashgrove, I think, for the last two years there's been a whole lot of things that have been delivered for schools, for community groups, for the environment, and also for some of the traffic upgrades we've done. So, I'm just going to do what I have to do.
