CG Response:

- The Queensland Government is working with a number of projects proponents, with the aim of opening up the Galilee Basin coal resources and boosting Queensland's economic development.
- With respect to the rail and port infrastructure requirements to facilitate development of the Galilee Basin, the Government has made clear its policy position. In June 2012, the Deputy Premier, Minister for State Development, Infrastructure and Planning, announced the government's preference for the development of two common rail corridors to service the Galilee Basin through to the Port of Abbot Point and noted that the government was considering what support it could provide through the use of the Coordinator-General's powers such as the declaration of State Development Areas. While the Government stated that it would not consider supporting rail proposals that were not related or linked to the then preferred east to west and south to north common rail corridors, proponents could continue to progress their proposed projects at their own risk.

- Proponents continue to pursue their proposals for the Galilee Basin, and in
 this context, the Coordinator-General decided that the Galilee Coal Project
 (Northern Export Facility) defined by Waratah Coal, as assessed (mine and
 rail), could proceed subject to a range of conditions to adequately manage
 environmental and social impacts. The project as assessed by the
 Coordinator-General is currently being considered by the Commonwealth.
 Waratah Coal also has two applications with the Coordinator-General for
 declarations for Infrastructure Facilities of Significance for its rail and port
 developments. These applications are under assessment by the CoordinatorGeneral.
- Regarding port development at Abbot Point, in December 2012 the
 Government announced the proposed expansion of the coal handling and
 export facilitates at Abbot Point, beyond the existing infrastructure and
 prospective terminals, T0, T2 and T3 (the AP-X Project) and invited
 registrations of interest in the process. In April 2013 the government
 announced the preferred proponents and made it clear that other parties,
 (including Waratah Coal) were free to engage with the preferred proponents
 regarding access to the infrastructure proposed for development.
